Kanazawa Castle Town

Kanazawa – Town with a mixture of old traditions and new culture

The castle town of Kanazawa was built by the Maeda family of the Kaga clan in the late 16th century. The Maeda family promoted the city's development by arranging samurai and townspeople's residential areas and the temple districts around Kanazawa Castle. Kanazawa then grew to become Japan's largest castle town, ruled by a feudal lord who invested heavily in culture and education as opposed to military force, in an attempt to create a sophisticated, traditional culture. Kanazawa was Japan's fourth-largest city at the time, behind Tokyo, Osaka, and Kyoto.

Modern-day Kanazawa is one of the largest castle towns in Japan and retains many streets and cultural elements from the olden days owing to the fact that the city has escaped damage caused by war or major disasters for a period of over 400 years. Kanazawa's unique charms include the tourist spots of Kanazawa Castle, Kenrokuen Garden, the long-established fish market, teahouse districts, the samurai district and tradesmen towns, as well as its traditional culture such as crafts, entertainment, and food.

Along with its history and culture, today's Kanazawa also has new attractions including the 21st Century Museum of Contemporary Art, Kanazawa, which attracts attention from home and abroad, and districts that are home to fashionable gallery shops.

The Kaga clan provided sufficient protection and training to enable art and craft techniques to flourish under their rule. Kanazawa is renowned in Japan as a city of crafts and is the established

Kanazawa's traditional performing arts There is a saying in Kanazawa that goes "Utai (the chanting of a Noh text) falls down from the sky." Ever since the olden days, Noh plays have been enjoyed by samurai, merchants, and even by gardeners. You would often hear someone humming a verse from a Noh play while walking down the street in Kanazawa, which is where the above saying comes from. The unique Kaga Hosho Noh plays and the Subayashi musical accompaniment have been passed down through the generations, and remain part of citizens' lives to this day. Kanazawa is also known as one of Japan's leading cities for Geisha performers. The tea ceremony, an essential part of samurai culture, has also grown in popularity as a way to casually enjoy tea.



21st Century Museum of Contemporary Art, Kanazawa / Kenrokuen Garden and Vicinity

One can summarize the attraction of present-day Kanazawa as "coexistence of modernity and tradition" . For example, by simply venturing a little distance away from the downtown area that bustles with young people, you can come across a streetscape dating back several centuries. This is the area that symbolizes the attraction of present-day Kanazawa. The 21st Century Museum of Contemporary Art, Kanazawa exhibits a wide range of modern art by artists from all over the world; you can spend a long time there without tiring of the exhibits. Kanazawa Castle Park is a symbol of Kanazawa's traditional culture, and Kenrokuen Garden was created as the castle garden by successive generations of lords, beginning more that 300 years ago. As one of the three most famous gardens of Japan, it attracts many tourists. This area, in which newness and traditional culture coexist, is truly representative of modern-day Kanazawa.

③ Kenrokuen Garden 兼六園

This garden originated more than 300 years ago as the garden of the secondary residence of the feudal lord of that time.

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It is one of the best daimyo gardens, and one of the three most famous gardens in Japan. You can enjoy the Japanese atmosphere of its beautiful landscaping at any time of year.

4 Kanazawa Castle Park / Gyokusen'inmaru Garden 金沢城公園/玉泉院丸庭園

Kanazawa Castle Park is a park established by the Maeda family of the Kaga Domain. Full-scale construction of the castle began more than 400 years ago. Many of its buildings were burned down in repeated fires, but several structures, such as Ishikawa-mon Gate and Sanjikken Nagaya, are still standing; others are being restored with historical accuracy. Gyokusen'inmaru Garden existed until the abolition of the feudal domain system. and was restored in March 2015. Nakamura Memorial Museum 中村記念美術館

The museum has a collection of about 600 pieces, including excellent tea-ceremony works of art and interior furnishings. The collection mainly consists of art/craft objects donated by the Nakamura family, who run a sake brewing company. Some pieces have been designated as important cultural assets. Visitors can enjoy a bowl of powdered green tea while admiring the garden (¥200).

⑥ Seisonkaku Villa 成巽閣

This villa was built about 140 years ago by the 13th lord of Kaga, as a retirement residence for his mother. It incorporates two different styles of architecture. As there are very few daimyo family residences that have remained intact, this villa is highly unusual.

With its many traditional crafts, such as Kaga yuzen dyed silk, Wajima lacquerware and Kutani ceramic ware, Ishikawa is said to be a treasure house of crafts. Here you will see displays of these crafts and the tools used to make them, as well as manufacturing processes.



The World of Tea

Tea ceremony, part of traditional Japanese culture. is not simply making matcha tea, but rather a comprehensive art uniting the architecture of the tea room, tea utensils that are works of art in themselves, and a connection to Zen. Through Japanese tea ceremony, one can learn etiquette and spirituality. As the art of tea ceremony was required learning for samurai, Kanazawa actively conducts Japanese tea ceremonies, and even today matcha tea is readily available to be enjoyed.

At the Nishidake Family's Gyokusen-en Garden, if you make a reservation at least three days in advance, you can drink matcha tea while watching a Japanese tea ceremony with an English



Korinbo / Kata-machi / Naga-machi and Vicinity

The area that comprises Ishikawa Prefecture, where Kanazawa is located, Toyama Prefecture to the east, and Fukui Prefecture to the west is called Hokuriku. Korinbo/Katamachi is the largest commercial area in Hokuriku. With its concentration of various kinds of people and shops, it is the most important center for both people and products in this area. If you are walking around looking for a place to have lunch or dinner, or to have tea, this is probably the area where you can enjoy yourself the most. People looking for typical Kanazawa dishes, or those who miss the tastes of their home country can probably find the type of restaurant they are looking for here. Of course, this area is also recommended for shopping, and for people who want to spend an evening in Kanazawa enjoying some good drinks. If you go a little beyond the commercial district, you can walk through Naga-machi, an area that brings to mind the streetscape of samurai days. In this area there are also samurai residences and museums that evoke the lifestyle of the feudal period, so if you are interested in samurais and their culture, you should definitely go and have a look.

① Oyama Jinja Shrine 尾山神社

This shrine is dedicated to the first lord of Kaga, Maeda Toshije, Inlaid glass in the uppermost section of the three-tiered gate gives it an exotic appearance.

During the Edo period, the middleclass samurai of the Kaga Domain resided here. The narrow alleys, earthen walls, and

This museum displays weapons, art and craft items, letters, etc. belonging to the Tosanokami family, chief vassals of the Kaga clan. Visitors have free access to a lounge facing the small garden, conveniently located for resting after a stroll.

Japanese-style Pubs *"Izakayas"*

"Izakavas," restaurants that serve alcohol and food, are very common in Japan. There are many izakavas around Korinbo and Kata-machi, and after work or on weekend nights, the area is brimming with people going out to drink with co-workers and friends. Be sure to experience these Japanese-style pubs, where you can pair Japanese cuisine such as fresh sashimi with sake and beer, all at a reasonable price.



Kanazawa Station / Musashigatsuii / Owari-cho and Vicinity

The glass dome of Kanazawa Station has the nickname of "Motenashi Dome". Motenashi means "welcoming" or "entertainment"; it is a word that indicates good treatment of guests. The dome expresses the hospitality of the citizens of Kanazawa, who kindly greet and send off people who come to visit the rainy city, in the hope that they will not get wet when starting their journey. Omi-cho Market, said to be the "kitchen of the citizens of Kanazawa", is located in Musashigatsuji. About 300 years old, it is crammed with rows of seafood and vegetable shops. Looking around at all of the produce, you will get a sense of the market's unique vitality. Owari-cho, which was once inhabited by merchants and craftsmen, has many old shops that are still in business. You can enjoy the taste of such treats as oldfashioned confections and tsukudani (various foods boiled down in soy sauce). The atmospheric street that goes from Owari-cho to the Kazue-machi Chaya District by the Asanogawa River is the perfect place for a stroll.



Owari-cho, the Merchant Town

In the Edo period, Owari-cho, made up of merchants and artisans, was the main section of Jokamachi Kanazawa. The old townscape from the past still remains today. There are several stores that have been in business since the Edo period, and from the outside, you can see handmade displays of "merchant culture" passed down from previous generations in a few show windows.



Higashi Chaya District / Kazue-machi / Utatsuvama and Vicinity

Higashi means "east", utatsu means "east-southeast"; the names of the Higashi Chaya District and Mt. Utatsu (Utatsu-yama) derive from the fact that they are located in an easterly and east-southeasterly direction, respectively, as seen from Kanazawa Castle.

The Higashi Chaya District is one of three chaya districts in Kanazawa. Its streetscape, which has maintained a strong feudal-period atmosphere, is still throbbing with life. For example, in the evening, under the lights of the houses, you might be lucky enough to meet a group of geisha girls. These are not meant as an attraction for tourists: they are definitely one of the sights of modern Kanazawa that have remained throughout the city's long history. The Higashi Geisha District is an area where you can see and experience for yourself the traditional culture of Kanazawa. Mt. Utatsu is a mountain that Kanazawa citizens are familiar with as a place to relax that is close to the downtown area. You can go there in the spring to enjoy its cherry blossoms, and in the fall to enjoy its crimson foliage.




Walk Through the Utatsuyama Temple Area

designed to protect against enemy invasions, the atmosphere of the Edo period still lingers at this mountain temple. Away from the hustle and bustle. the peaceful view of the small paths and roofs covered with black tiles is especially beautiful in the evening. This is one of Kanazawa's little-known travel locations.

No-machi / Tera-machi and Vicinity

Tera means "temple". As the name indicates, there are about 70 temples in Teramachi. About 400 years ago, temples that were dotted around the city were moved to Teramachi and the base of Mt. Utatsu. Myoryuji Temple, known by its nickname of Ninja Temple, will probably surprise you with its various contraptions. The sound of bells at dusk also makes a deep impression on visitors.

The Art of Kanazawa Geiko

In Kanazawa, where this tradition has been passed down since the Edo period, there are approximately 50 Kanazawa geiko (geisha girls) active in the three Chaya Districts. The old custom where you need the invitation of a regular customer to attend a dinner party in a tatami room is still being passed down today.

Although it is normally not possible to meet the geiko, depending on the season, the general public may have the chance to see the dance of the Kanazawa geiko.

If you walk the streets of the Chaya District, you might hear the sounds of the shamisen or taiko drums flowing from the tea rooms.

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Kodatsuno / Nodayama and Vicinity

Kodatsuno is southeast of Kenrokuen Garden. There are many temples here too, as well as residential neighborhoods, schools and hospitals; it is a good place for getting a close-up look at the Kanazawa way of life. Nodayama is an immense cemetery where many figures of historical importance to Kanazawa, such as members of the Maeda family, have been laid to rest. It is said that there are more than 50 thousand gravestones in the cemetery, and many people go there to pay their respects.



① Tentokuin Temple 天徳院

This is the family temple of Tama-hime, the princess who came to Kaga in 1601 to marry into the Maeda family. Even now, a wind-up-doll play about the 24-year-long life of Kanazawa's beloved Tama-hime is performed at the temple every day.

Here you can experience Zen meditation - the seeking of enlightenment through detachment and silence, by sitting guietly and concentrating. The building has been designated as a cultural asset of national importance.

From Nodayama, a hill located in the southwestern part of the urban area of Kanazawa, you can see the whole urban area. It is popular as a spot from which to see the city at night; if you have a car, the view is well worth the drive.

The World of Zen

Kanazawa, the birthplace of the Buddhist philosopher Daisetz Suzuki, who made Zen culture known around the world, has been a flourishing place for Buddhism since ancient times. At Daijoji Temple, Zen meditation starts at 4:15 AM and continues for the entire day without a pause, and in the morning you can join the monks for their ascetic practices. In addition, at the Zen meditation sessions held every Sunday from 1:30 PM, or the temple stays, you have the chance to quietly collect yourself.
